April 9, 2026

Water and Wastewater Department:

1. City Wells in production are operating properly. Averaged 0.423 thousand gallons per day for the month of March. The water wells have produced 13.116 million gallons for the month of March.
2. Water Dept: A Monthly Report is attached for Mayor and Council review.
3. Clark Well is back up and running. We are flushing it and preparing to put back into service.
4. Water Dept: The City and Westwood meters were read on March 15. We still have approximately 185 meters that are not reading. Employees are replacing endpoints daily.
5. The City turned off services for 58 customers. There are still 11 customers turned off for nonpayment.
6. City Employees had a total of 57 Work Orders for the month of March. The city has 18 work orders that have not been completed or processed. A Service Order Report is attached.
7. Mims Creek WWTP: The WWTP had an average daily flow of N/A thousand gallons for the month. The WWTP treated 4.000 million gallons estimated for the month. The WWTP is operating properly. We had our flow meter fail. We ordered a new meter, and it has been installed. A Monthly Report is attached.
 - Thousand Oaks lift station: Another new Tsurimi pump has been ordered and waiting for it to arrive.
 - We had a 12" rubber to flange dresser leak in the wet well at Thousand Oaks lift station. It has been installed and, in the process, had another one

blow out so we replaced it with the spare. There are two more of those pumps in that wet well, so we went ahead and ordered two more of those dressers.

- Walnut Creek lift station: Everything is running well there.
8. TDCJ Boyd Unit WWTP/ WTP: A complete TDCJ Monthly Report is attached.
 - WWTP: The WWTP had an average daily flow of .143 thousand gallons a Day. The WWTP treated 4.422 million gallons for the month of March.
 - WTP: The WTP averaged .212 thousand gallons a day. The water wells produced 6.578 million gallons for the month.

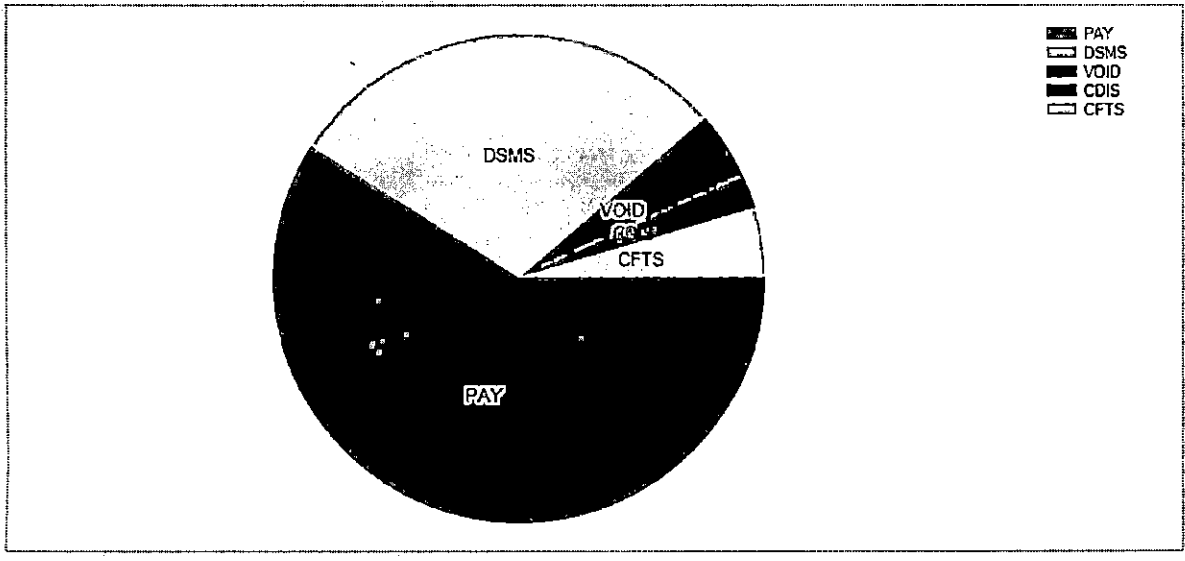

President's Report

April 1, 2026

1. I attended the city council meeting on March 10, 2026, and Project Rowdy was approved. The city voted to hire a new city administrator by the name of Doug Key. As reported by Mayor Nichols, he will start on Thursday, April 2, 2026.
2. Project Rowdy Update: Rowdy Transport has been operating out of the new building in the industrial park and is servicing trucks and trailers. The company is still reviewing the documents that were approved, and the owner has been out of the country on vacation. A press release about the company will be forthcoming after all documents are approved by the company.
3. Bournias Property Update: Tommy Glick will have the remainder of the property cleared and grubbed in about a week or less. This will give us 30 acres of shovel ready property along Old Mexia Road.

6. I will be hosting our next quarterly regional EDC meeting in Fairfield on April 6, 2026.
7. Our marketing partner, Global Site Location Partnership (GSLI), has launched our 11th email marketing campaign. This campaign is directed specifically at logistics, distribution, and trucking companies.

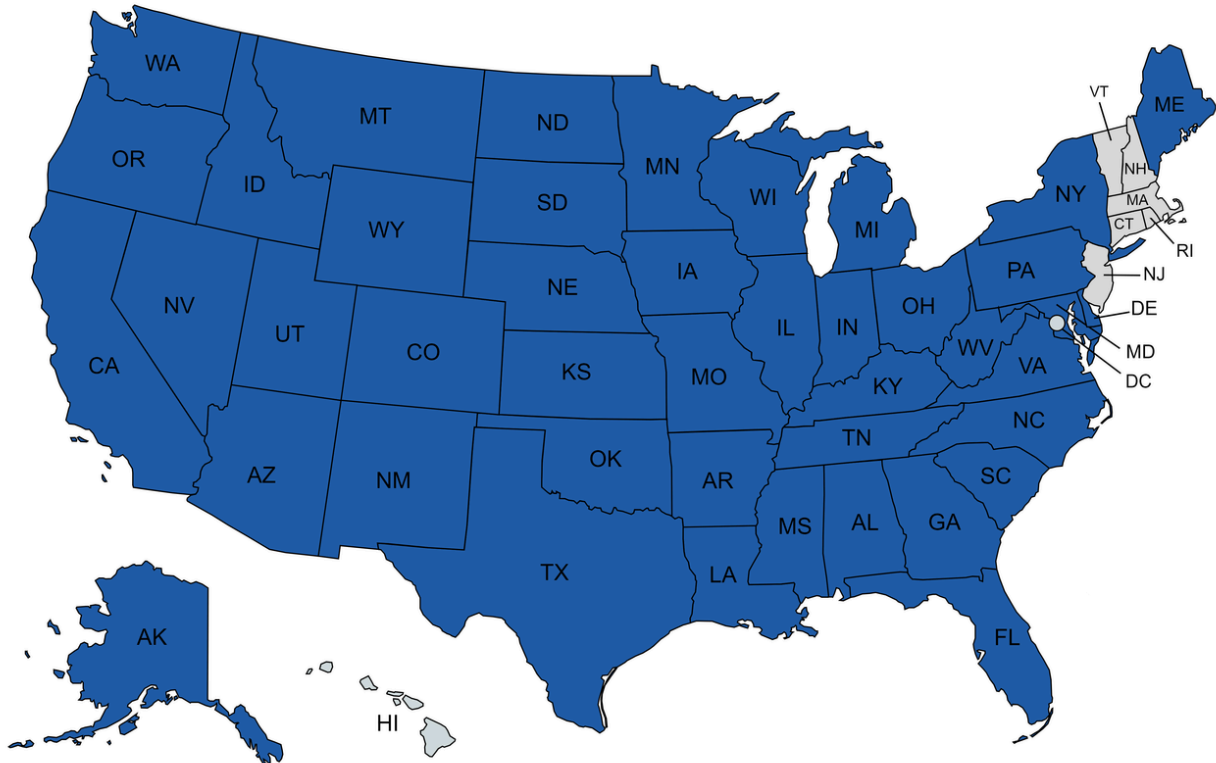

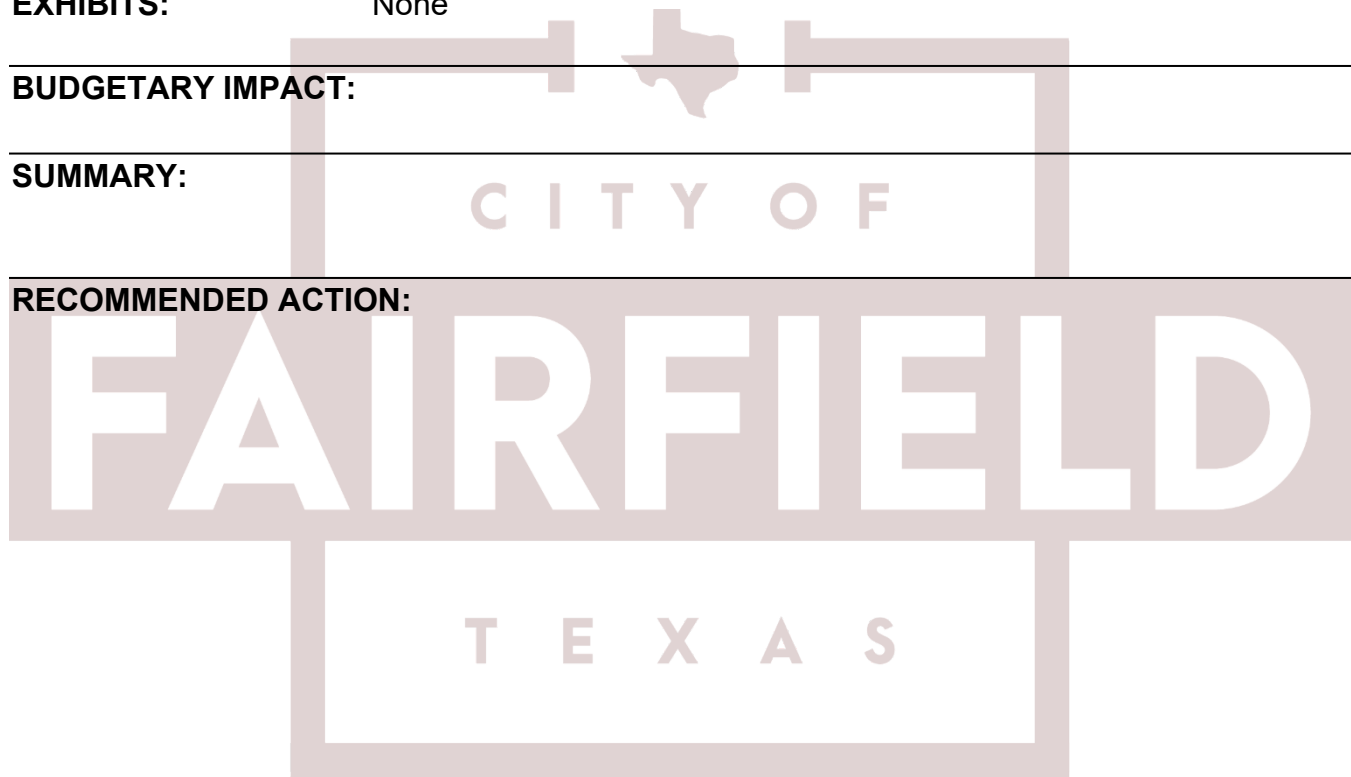

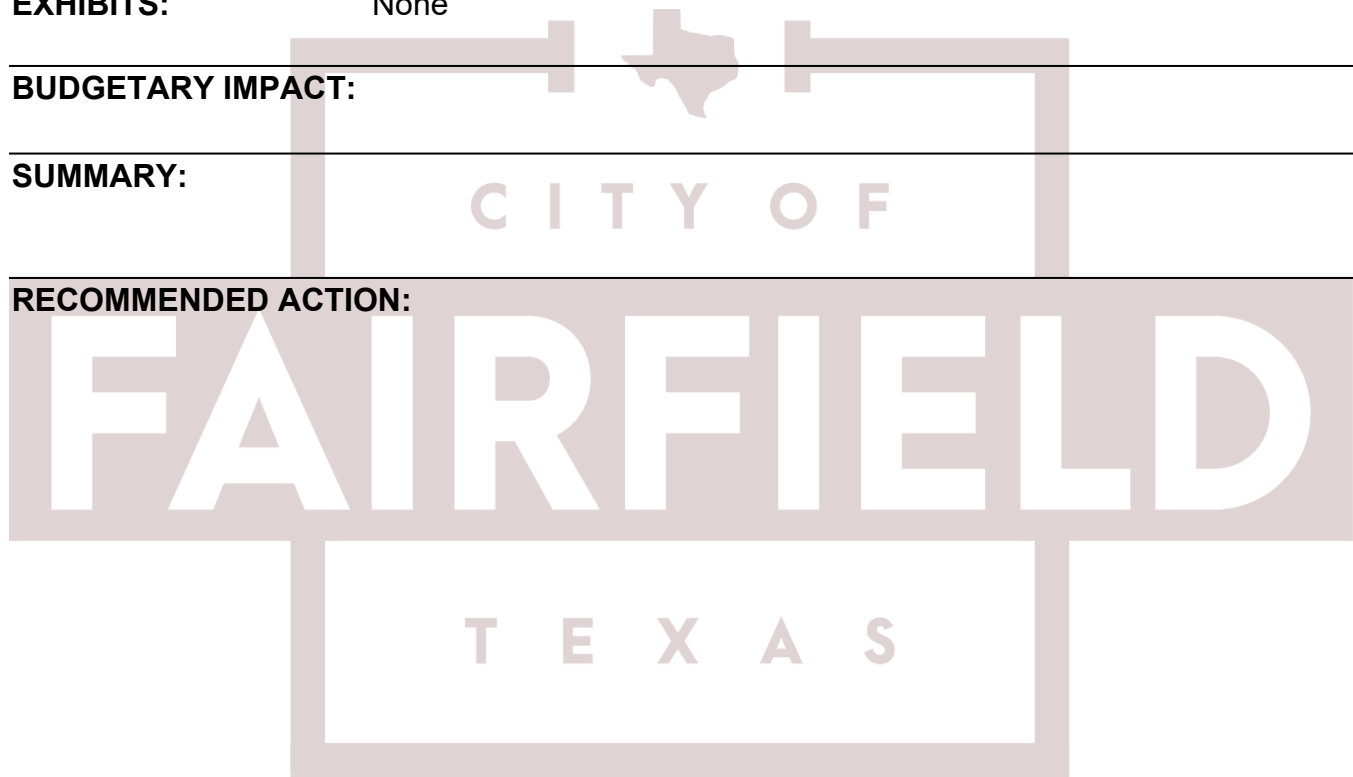

SUBCHAPTER B - LP-GAS INSTALLATIONS, CONTAINERS, APPURTENANCES AND EQUIPMENT REQUIREMENTS

§9.101. Filings Required for Stationary LP-Gas Installations

(a) General Requirements. No LP-gas container shall be placed into LP-gas service or an installation operated or used in LP-gas service until the requirements of this section, as applicable, are met and the facility is in compliance with all applicable rules in this chapter and statutes. LP-gas systems under the jurisdiction of DOT Safety regulations in 49 CFR Parts 192 and 199, and Part 40 shall comply with Chapter 8 of this title (relating to Pipeline Safety Regulations) prior to implementation of service.

(b) Commercial installations with an aggregate water capacity of less than 10,000 gallons.

(1) Within 30 calendar days following the completion of a container installation, the licensee shall submit LPG Form 501 to AFS stating:

(A) the installation fully complies with the statutes and rules in this chapter;

(B) all necessary Commission licenses, certificates, and permits have been issued; and

(C) the date the installation has been placed into LP-gas service.

(2) The licensee shall pay a nonrefundable fee of \$10 for each LP-gas container, including cylinders, each retail LP-gas cylinder exchange storage rack, and each forklift cylinder exchange rack or a forklift cylinder exchange installation where a storage rack is not installed that is listed on the form. A nonrefundable \$35 fee shall be required for any resubmission.

(3) AFS shall review the submitted information within 21 business days of receipt of all required information and shall notify the applicant in writing of any deficiencies. LP-gas activities may commence prior to the submission of LPG Form 501 if the facility is in compliance with the rules in this chapter.

(c) Aggregate water capacity of 10,000 gallons or more.

(1) For installations with an aggregate water capacity of 10,000 gallons or more, the licensee shall submit the following information to AFS at least 30 days prior to construction if the applicant is required to give notice as described in §9.102 of this title (relating to Notice of Stationary LP-Gas Installations):

(A) LPG Form 500;

(B) LPG Form 500A with all applicable documents;

(C) a plat drawing from the appropriate appraisal district identifying:

(i) the facility's property boundaries;

(ii) the names of all real property owners within 500 feet; and

(iii) a 500-foot radius measured from the proposed container location on the site.

(D) a site plan of sufficient scale that identifies:

- (i) the location, types, and sizes of all LP-gas containers already on site or proposed to be on site;
- (ii) the distances from the containers to adjoining property lines, buildings, and railroad, pipeline, or roadway rights-of-way;
- (iii) any known potential hazards;
- (iv) location of bulkhead and distance from nearest container;
- (v) location of remote emergency shut-off valves;
- (vi) route of vehicular traffic around containers;
- (vii) location of any electrically operated material handling equipment such as pumps or compressors; and
- (viii) distance and location to nearest highway; and

(E) if the facility is accessed from a public highway under the jurisdiction of the Texas Department of Transportation, a statement or permit from the Texas Department of Transportation showing that the driveway is of proper design and construction to allow safe entry and egress of the LP-gas transports; and

(F) a nonrefundable fee of \$50 for the initial application, or a nonrefundable \$30 fee for any resubmission.

(2) Prior to the installation of any individual LP-gas container, AFS shall determine whether the proposed installation constitutes a danger to the public health, safety, and welfare.

(A) AFS may impose restrictions or conditions on the proposed LP-gas installation based on one or more of the following factors:

- (i) nature and density of the population or occupancy of structures within 500 feet of the proposed or existing container locations;
- (ii) nature of use of property located within 500 feet of the LP-gas installation;
- (iii) nature and volume of vehicular traffic within 500 feet of the proposed container;
- (iv) type and number of roadways within 500 feet of the proposed container;
- (v) type of activities on the installation's premises;
- (vi) potential sources of ignition that might affect an LP-gas leak;
- (vii) existence of dangerous or combustible materials in the area that might be affected by an emergency situation;
- (viii) any other factors material to the public health, safety, and welfare.

(B) The Commission does not consider public health, safety, and welfare to include such factors as the value of property adjacent to the installation, the esthetics of the proposed installation, or similar considerations.

(3) AFS shall notify the applicant in writing of its findings.

(4) If the application is administratively denied:

(A) AFS shall specify the deficiencies in the written notice required in paragraph (3) of this subsection.

(B) The applicant may modify the submission and resubmit it for approval or request a hearing on the matter in accordance with Chapter 1 of this title (relating to Practice and Procedure).

(5) The licensee shall not commence construction until notice of approval is received from AFS. If the subject installation is not completed within one year from the date AFS has granted construction approval, the application will expire and the applicant shall submit a new application before the installation can be completed.

(6) The applicant shall submit to AFS written notice of completed construction and the Commission shall complete the field inspection specified in §9.109 of this title (relating to Physical Inspection of Stationary LP-Gas Installations).

(7) The container may be placed into service after AFS has completed the inspection and determines the installation meets all safety requirements.

(8) An applicant or operator shall not be required to submit LPG Form 500, LPG Form 500A, or a site plan prior to the installation of bulkheads, swivel-type piping, breakaway devices, pneumatically-operated internal valves, or emergency shutoff valves, or when maintenance and improvements are being made to the piping system at an existing LP-gas installation with an aggregate water capacity of 10,000 gallons or more.

(9) If a licensee is replacing a container with a container of the same or less overall diameter and length or height, and is installing the replacement container in the identical location of the existing container, the licensee shall file LPG Form 500.

(d) AFS may request LPG Form 8, a Manufacturer's Data Report, or any other documentation or information pertinent to the installation in order to determine compliance with the rules in this chapter.

(e) For an installation that is a licensee outlet, the operating licensee shall comply with §9.7(g) of this title (relating to Applications for Licenses, Manufacturer Registrations, and Renewals).

§9.102. Notice of Stationary LP-Gas Installations

(a) For a proposed installation with an aggregate water capacity of 10,000 gallons or more, an applicant shall send a copy of the filings required under §9.101(c) of this title (relating to Filings Required for Stationary LP-Gas Installations) by certified mail, return receipt requested or otherwise delivered, to all owners of real property situated within 500 feet of any proposed container location at the same time the originals are filed with AFS.

(1) AFS shall consider the notice to be sufficient when the applicant has provided evidence that copies of a complete application have been mailed or otherwise delivered to all real property owners.

(2) The applicant may obtain names and addresses of owners from current county tax rolls.

**2026 CONSUMER PRICE INDEX (CPI) ADJUSTMENT TO MUNICIPAL
TELECOMMUNICATIONS RIGHT-OF-WAY ACCESS LINE RATES**

February 28, 2026

PURPOSE

This letter is to notify you that your city's 2026 maximum access line rates have increased by 1.1157% due to inflation, as measured by the CPI. This adjustment has been made pursuant to Chapter 283 of the Local Government Code (House Bill 1777).

DEFAULT RATES FOR 2026: NO CHANGE

Based on the choice made by your city in April 2025, your city's 2026 rate will either be adjusted for inflation, or will remain the same as your 2025 rate. According to our records, when similar CPI adjustments were made in April 2025, you opted NOT to adjust your rates for inflation, (i.e. you chose LESS than the maximum allowable CPI-adjusted rates). Therefore, your 2026 rates will REMAIN at your 2025 level and your rates will NOT increase. You have the option to refuse this default rate and request an increase in rates by taking the action explained below.

ACTION BY CITY: TO REQUEST AN INCREASE

(1) You do not have to respond if you desire to keep your 2026 rates at the 2025 levels. (2) Respond ONLY if you want an INCREASE from the 2025 rates. (3) To request an increase, notify the PUC using page 2 of this letter no later than April 30, 2026. (4) The PUC does not require City council authorization; however, if your city charter requires it, please do so immediately. (5) Verify your contact information and highlight any changes. (6) Make a copy of this document.

WHAT HAPPENS IF A CITY DOES NOT RESPOND BY APRIL 30, 2026?

If a city does not respond by April 30, 2026, the rates for your city will remain at the 2025 levels. The next opportunity to adjust your rates will be September 1, 2026.

WHAT HAPPENS NEXT?

The PUC will notify telephone companies of your desired rates and your city will be compensated accordingly no later than July 1, 2026.

FUTURE REVISIONS TO CPI

The access line rates will be revised annually in March depending on whether the CPI changes for the previous year. If the CPI changes for the year 2026, you will receive a similar letter in 2027.

I. POLICY

It shall be the policy of the Fairfield Police Department to protect the integrity of the CJIS database and all data and information obtained through use of Mobile Data Terminals and/or hard-wired TLETS terminals by strictly following the procedures outlined in this General Order.

II. PURPOSE

Establish guidelines for use and security of the department-issued TLETS Terminal, Mobile Data Terminal (MDT) equipment and related CJIS information. Failure to comply with this policy can result in disciplinary action or termination.


III. DEFINITIONS

1. TLETS Terminal – This term includes all computers (normally desktop) that have access, via wireless or hardwired network, to TLETS, TCIC, NCIC or any law enforcement database.
2. MDT – Mobile Data Terminal. This term includes all computers that have access, via wireless or hardwired network, to TLETS, TCIC, NCIC or any law enforcement database.
3. Secure location – This term includes the areas of the Fairfield Police Department that are not open to the public and accessible only by authorized personnel. This term also includes official police vehicles that are locked and/or attended by authorized sworn police personnel.
4. Non-secure location – This term includes all locations not defined as "secure location" above.

IV. PROCEDURES

1. CJIS, TLETS, TCIC and NCIC data shall be accessed ONLY from secure locations, as defined above.
2. Each person authorized to access Terminal/MDT data shall receive security awareness training within six months of appointment or employment and thereafter at least every two years, in accordance with CJIS policy. The training will be documented and placed in the employees training file.
3. The Chief of Police or designee will maintain a roster and/or agency-issued credentials (officer badge, access card, etc.) of authorized personnel with unescorted access into physically secure areas.
4. When transporting non-law enforcement personnel in police vehicles, officers will close the screen of the MDT or position it in a manner that will prevent unauthorized viewing of MDT data. TLETS terminal screens shall be positioned to prevent unauthorized viewing.
5. A User/Operator List shall be reviewed annually and updated as needed. The annual review will be documented and changes in authorized personnel will be immediately reported to TCIC Training section by the Department Terminal Agency Coordinator (TAC).
6. All printouts containing CJIS data shall be promptly shredded. Disposal or destruction is witnessed or carried out by authorized personnel.
7. All storage media containing or used for CJIS data which is no longer used shall be secure formatted using methodology that over-writes all data in three iterations or degaussed prior to disposal or release for reuse by unauthorized personnel. If the Storage media is no longer needed, the media will be destroyed. Inoperable electronic media shall be physically destroyed. Sanitation or destruction is witnessed or carried out by authorized personnel and documented.
8. The Department shall maintain a list of all MDT IDs and contact(s) so that devices can be promptly disabled, should the need arise.
9. The local CJIS network equipment shall be located in a physically secure location.
10. All law enforcement vehicles containing MDTs shall be securely locked when not in use.

11. All computers used for processing CJIS data shall have anti-virus software installed. All systems will have the latest updates for the operating system & anti-virus. MDT(s) shall have a personal firewall enabled.
12. Formal Incident Response Plan. -If there is a breach of security in the CJIS Network, it shall be the responsibility of each authorized user to report any violations of this security policy up the chain-of-command and/or proper authorities.
13. No personal computing devices (PC, laptop, tablet, mobile phone, etc.) or software shall be allowed access to the Police Department IT network or the TLETS network.
14. No publicly accessible computers shall be allowed on the agency's TLETS network.
15. No information system-related items are allowed to be removed from the secure location without prior authorization by the Chief of Police or designee.
16. Fairfield Police Department has a Security Alert and Advisories process which is maintained by the CJIS Local Appointed Security Officer (LASO).

I. POLICY (TBP 7.36)

The use of artificial intelligence such as License Plate Reader (LPR) technology to reduce crime and maintain public safety in the City of Fairfield is authorized by the Chief of Police. As such, it is the policy of this agency that all members abide by the guidelines set forth herein when utilizing license plate reader (LPR) systems. This policy applies only to LPR information, which is collected, accessed, used, disseminated, retained, and purged by this department. This policy does not apply to any other types of information which is accessed, retained, or used by this agency.

II. PURPOSE

To provide personnel with guidelines and principles for the collection, access, use, dissemination, retention, and purging of license plate reader (LPR) information to ensure that the information is used for legitimate law enforcement purposes only and that privacy, civil rights, and civil liberties of individuals are not violated.

III. DEFINITIONS

- A. Alert - A visual and/or auditory notice that is triggered when the LPR system receives a potential “hit” on a license plate.
- B. Criminal Intelligence Information – Data compiled to anticipate, prevent, or monitor possible criminal activities and potential criminal acts of individuals.
- C. Fixed LPR system – LPR cameras that are permanently affixed to a structure, such as a pole, a traffic barrier, or a bridge.
- D. Hit – A read, matched to a license plate, which has previously been registered on an agency’s “hot list” of vehicle plates related to stolen vehicles, wanted vehicles, or other factors supporting investigation, or which has been registered by a user for further investigation.
- E. Hot list – A database containing license plate numbers of stolen cars, vehicles owned by persons of interest, or vehicles associated with Statewide Alerts from a variety of sources, including the National Crime Information Center (NCIC), Department of Homeland Security (DHS), and Texas Crime Information System

(TCIC). Law enforcement agencies may also manually add license plate numbers to hot lists to be alerted if and when a vehicle license plate of interest is read by the LPR system. These lists serve an officer safety function as well as an investigatory purpose.

F. LPR – License Plate Recognition / License Plate Reader

G. OCR – Optical Character Recognition

H. Read – Digital images of license plates and vehicles and associated metadata (e.g., date, time, and geographic coordinates associated with the vehicle image capture) that are captured by the LPR system.

IV. GENERAL

LPR data information contains images of vehicles and license plates which are available for public view on a public road or street or that are on private property whose license plate(s) are visible from a public road, or place to which the public has access. As such, the capturing of this information does not require any predicate level of cause to gather license plate information by these systems. LPR data is comprised of vehicle and license plate captures and does not include specific identification of individuals. (TBP 7.36)

A. Criminal intelligence obtained through the LPR system may include the following authorized uses:

1. Enhance the Texas AMBER/SILVER or other law enforcement alerts to rapidly identify and locate vehicles related to potential child-abduction or other serious crimes.
2. Alert law enforcement that a particular license plate on a “hot list” is near to assist in locating stolen vehicles, dangerous, or wanted individuals.
3. Identify plates associated with potential witnesses and/or victims of violent crime.
4. Support homeland security by protecting critical infrastructure from individuals who intend to damage or disrupt those systems.
5. Support law enforcement in the identification of subjects associated with or targets of a criminal investigation.

B. The Lieutenant is designated as the Agency LPR Administrator who is responsible with administrative oversight for the LPR systems and is responsible for:

1. Establishing protocols for access, collection, storage, and retention of LPR data and associated media files.
2. Acting as the authorizing official for access to the LPR information.
3. Ensuring stored LPR information is automatically purged from the database, unless determined to be of evidentiary value.

4. Maintaining records identifying LPR deployment locations and documenting significant incidents and arrests that are related to LPR usage.
 5. Conducting audits to ensure compliance with applicable laws, regulations, and policy and that all information that is retained has relevancy and importance.
 6. Receiving reports regarding alleged errors and violations of the LPR policy and coordinating a resolution of the issue.
 7. Checking equipment on a regular basis to ensure functionality and camera alignment.
- C. Criminal intelligence information obtained through the LPR systems shall not be collected or maintained about organizations, corporations, businesses, partnerships, or individual groups based solely on their political, religious, social views, or activities unless such information directly relates to an investigation of criminal activities, and there are reasonable grounds to suspect that the subject of the information is or may be involved in criminal activities.
- D. Criminal intelligence information obtained through the LPR system shall not be collected based solely on an individual's race, ethnicity, citizenship, place of origin, gender, or other classification protected by law.
- E. A standard LPR record contains, at a minimum, an Optical Character Recognition (OCR) interpretation of the captured image, a photo of the license plate and a contextual photo of an area surrounding the plate, the geographic coordinates of where the image was captured, the date and time of the record, and the specific camera/unit that captured the image.

V. ACQUIRING AND RECEIVING LPR INFORMATION

- A. The department will directly collect and retain LPR information that is acquired using the LPR system.
1. The hardware and software licenses associated with the LPR system are the property of Genetec or Flock Safety through leased agreements.
 2. All information captured, stored, generated, or produced by the LPR system is the property of this department, regardless of where the information is stored.
 3. Hotlist data for Genetec LPR equipment will be downloaded to the system from the Texas DPS / TCIC once daily and will automatically be uploaded to the LPR system.
 4. Hotlist data for Flock Safety LPR equipment will be downloaded to the system from the Texas DPS / TCIC once daily and will automatically be uploaded to the LPR system.
- B. The department has established standards for any external agency requesting access to the department's LPR information. These standards are documented in

an Interagency Local Agreement (ILA)/Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) and include an assurance that the external agency complies with the laws and rules governing those individual agencies regarding data-entry, maintenance, security, and disseminations, which are consistent with these standards.

- C. The department will not directly or indirectly seek, receive, accept, or retain LPR information from:
 - 1. An individual or non-governmental agency that may receive a fee or benefit for providing the LPR information.
 - 2. An individual or information provider that is legally prohibited from obtaining or disclosing LPR information.
- D. The department will not sell, publish, exchange, disclose or release LPR information or data to commercial or private entities or individuals except as required by law.
- E. Hot list information is considered confidential to the extent permitted by and will be updated daily.
- F. Manual entry of specific LPR information is permitted for reports of crimes, crime bulletins, Statewide Alerts, or other law enforcement investigative purposes where a license plate number applies.

VI. PROCEDURES (TBP 7.36)

Access to the LPR system or disclosure of LPR information will be provided to individuals within the department or another law enforcement agency who are authorized to have access through a MOU. Access must be for legitimate law enforcement purposes to conduct investigations pursuant to official duties. This information must be needed in connection with that investigation.

- A. Access to the LPR Server and system will be provided to authorized IT personnel charged with responsibility for system administration and maintenance.
- B. The department may query LPR information from the agency's data or another law enforcement agency with whom we have an MOU for information which:
 - 1. Is based on a possible threat to public safety or the enforcement of criminal law.
 - 2. Is based on reasonable suspicion that an individual or vehicle may be involved in criminal activity and that the information is relative to criminal activity.
 - 3. Is relevant to the investigation and prosecution of suspected criminal incidents or the prevention of crime.
 - 4. Is related to an investigation or mission of law enforcement and the information was collected in a fair and lawful manner.

- C. Whenever a user is alerted to a hit on license plate information and prior to taking any law enforcement action, officers will be required to:
 - 1. Visually verify that the vehicle plate number matches the plate number run by the LPR system, including both alphanumeric characters of the license plate and the state of issuance.
 - 2. Verify the current status of the plate through dispatch or MDT query when circumstances allow.
 - 3. Confirm whether the alert pertains to the registrant of the vehicle or the vehicle itself.
- D. If an officer witnesses a violation of law or other action that establishes reasonable suspicion for a stop, the officer may conduct a stop based on that reasonable suspicion.
- E. In each case in which an alert or a hit is triggered, and the user takes enforcement actions, the user will record the disposition of the alert and the hit into the call notes of the call.

VII. QUALITY ASSURANCE (TBP 7.36)

- A. Only departmental personnel who have been trained in the use and operational protocols of the LPR systems shall be permitted to use or access information contained within the system. The training program will cover:
 - 1. The purpose of the LPR Policy.
 - 2. The intent of the provisions of this policy relates to collection, receipt, access, use, dissemination, retention, and purging of LPR information.
 - 3. Privacy, civil rights, and liberties on the use of the information collected or received.
 - 4. Appropriate procedures relating to license plate image quality and mitigating the risks associated with a possible misread by the LPR system.
 - 5. LPR verification process for law enforcement alerts.
 - 6. Mechanisms for reporting errors and violations of the LPR policy provisions.
- B. Designated, trained personnel shall check LPR equipment on a regular basis to ensure functionality and proper camera alignment.
- C. Any equipment that falls outside expected functionality shall be removed from service until deficiencies have been corrected.

- D. Employees will not attempt to disconnect, modify, or change LPR equipment or software unless authorized to do so.
- E. Damage or other malfunctions to the equipment will be reported to the LPR Administrator.
- F. The Agency LPR Administrator will investigate, in a timely manner, alleged errors and deficiencies of LPR information or, if applicable, will request the originating agency investigate the alleged errors and deficiencies.
- G. The department will correct, notate, delete, or refrain from using LPR information found to be erroneous or deficient.
- H. The department will review the quality of LPR information it has received from an originating agency and will advise the appropriate point of contact, in writing or electronically, when its LPR information is alleged, suspected, or found to be erroneous or deficient.
- I. Login/Logout Procedures are required to ensure proper access and facilitate oversight of the LPR system. All users are required to have individual credentials for access and use of the systems and/or data.
- J. Usernames and passwords to LPR information are not transferable, shall not be shared, and must be kept confidential.
- K. The department has adopted administrative and technical safeguards, including audit trails, to ensure against unauthorized access.
 - 1. A record indicating who has accessed data, reason for the access and the date of each access is maintained by the system.
 - 2. The LPR Administrator will conduct and maintain a written audit every six months of those individuals who accessed the LPR system.
 - 3. The audit trail will be kept for a minimum of **Four (4) years.**
 - 4. The Chief of Police will review this policy annually and make appropriate changes in response to changes in applicable law, technology, the audit review, and public expectations.
- L. This agency will provide a copy of this policy to any participating agencies or individual authorized users outside this agency and will require a written agreement to comply with this policy and the provisions it contains.
- M. If an employee or a participating agency is found to be in non-compliance with the provisions of this policy, the LPR Administrator or Chief of Police will:
 - 1. Suspend or discontinue access to information by that employee or participating agency.



2. Apply appropriate disciplinary action or administrative actions or sanctions.
3. If the authorized user is from a participating agency, request that the user's employer initiate disciplinary action to enforce the policy provisions.

VIII. RETENTION AND PURGING

LPR information obtained by the Genetec LPR system will be stored for a period not to exceed **3 years**. After **3 years**, the information will be automatically purged and removed from the system.

LPR information obtained by the Flock Safety LPR system will be stored for a period not to exceed **3 years**. After **3 years**, the information will be automatically purged and removed from the system.

- A. This retention policy applies only to the LPR information contained in the LPR system itself. Once an LPR record has been downloaded or incorporated into an investigative case file, the LPR information is then considered part of that case.

Scope and Purpose

The Canine (K9) Unit’s purpose is to provide trained canine elements to assist in the prevention and detection of crime; to track and trail persons sought by the Fairfield Police Department; to search buildings; to provide investigative aid to the officer on the street; and to perform other duties as may be directed by the Chief of the Fairfield Police Department or his staff.

The use of police service dogs is a legitimate tool for law enforcement. Although their greatest value lies in the deterring effect of their presence, the use of a police service dog in making or maintaining an arrest is authorized when the circumstances justify such use. In this connection, all members of the Police Department must be aware that the use of a police service dog in making or maintaining an arrest constitutes the use of force or an implied threat of force. Therefore, it is imperative that the canine handler be fully cognizant of all facts and circumstances surrounding the situation before a decision is made to deploy the canine.

No operations manual or set of directives can address all situations that may arise during the performance of duty. Policy is broad in scope to encompass most situations. It is stated in general terms. This document conveys the same authority as other department rules, regulations, policies and procedures. Compliance is required by all members of the Canine Unit. Violations of any portion of the Canine Unit Operations policy may result in disciplinary action.

Mission Statement

The Canine Unit is a centralized uniform support service, which offers a specialized resource to the Fairfield Police Department through the professional utilization of an effective law enforcement tool, the Police Service Dog (PSD). The mission of the Canine Unit is to enhance the Police Department’s efforts in crime prevention and detection, criminal apprehension, officer safety, and service to the community. The Canine Unit is capable of providing assistance in several critical areas including, but not limited to:

- Officer protection
- The apprehension of suspects
- Psychological deterrent to suspect aggression
- Searching for suspects or evidence
- General law enforcement duties

Objectives

1. Develop and maintain highly trained and well-disciplined canine teams that are capable of maximum operational utilization and are applied in objectively reasonable circumstances.
2. The canine will be measured through weekly maintenance training, annual demonstration and evaluation of general performance standards, in accordance with NNDDA general performance standards regarding patrol and narcotic detection certifications. In the event a canine does not meet the annual test certification, he will be removed from service until such general performance standards are met.
3. Enhance enforcement efforts, officer safety, and public safety by providing an effective non-lethal force option to the operations section.
4. Measured through adherence to daily staffing requirements, response to canine related radio calls for service, appropriate deployment of the police service dog, and the recording of noteworthy incidents in the canine log.
5. Provide support to each unit or section in routine enforcement and crime specific problem solving.
6. Measure by response to non-canine related radio calls and self-initiated enforcement activity.

Organization

1. The canine unit will answer to his/her assigned patrol Sergeant.
2. The Operations Lieutenant assumes the duties and responsibilities of the assignment in addition to his/her other assigned duties. The Lieutenant is responsible for the following:
3. The Operations Lieutenant is responsible for the evaluation and performance of the Canine Unit.
4. Maintaining records and statistics, preparing an annual budget, and submitting reports as required.
5. The Lieutenant will act as a liaison officer to the public regarding Canine Unit information.
6. Staying current on canine related issues.
7. Reviewing all incidents involving canine deployments.

Canine Handler

1. Canine handlers are expected to be able to perform all duties of a uniformed patrol officer, with the added duties of working a police service dog.
2. Overall responsibility for assigned police service dog in accordance with departmental policy and procedures.

3. Maintaining records and statistics, preparing an annual budget, and submitting reports as required.
4. Respond to calls for service and where the police dog's presence will further Field Operations goals and objectives.
5. Provide for timely cover and assistance upon requests from other police units.
6. Maintain required standards of proficiency for their assigned dog through required training.
7. Care for and maintain assigned dog.
8. Provide for medical care and treatment of their assigned police service dog.
9. Transports the dog to the veterinarian at any time such care and treatment is required.
10. Prepare and submit to the Operations Lieutenant all appropriate reports and logs pertinent to their activities.
11. Scheduling public appearances and demonstrations.

Assignment of Canine Teams

1. The canine team shall be scheduled by the Operations Lieutenant to meet the goals and objectives of the Police Department and the Canine Unit.
2. Deployment of Canine teams may be based upon specific needs of Patrol or other units requesting their assistance.
3. Shift hours shall remain flexible and may be adjusted to ensure proper coverage.
4. If assigned to K9 unit, the city will compensate the K9 handler with a "K9 Care Stipend" to compensate the care of the K9 while off-duty. The stipend amount will be based on the City of Fairfield's pay schedule.

Reports and Administrative Responsibilities

1. All activity reports shall be submitted to the Operations Lieutenant via the chain of command.
2. Canine officers should send all paperwork/reports through the normal flow. The Canine Officer shall route a copy of all canine related incidents to the Operations Lieutenant.

Inspections

1. The handler will be subjected to a quarterly inspection process conducted by the Lieutenant.

2. Additional canine related inspections will be conducted on an annual basis at the time of the handler's annual performance evaluation. The areas inspected will include the home kennel, issued canine equipment, vehicle, and canine medical status.

Activity Logs and Statistics

1. All canine handlers assigned to field duties will complete accurate activity and statistics as required.
2. Any canine calls for another agency will be documented for time spent and logged in monthly statistics.
3. Canine officers will document and report when any of the following occurs during any arrest:
 - a. Police service dog finds or apprehends a suspect
 - b. Suspect surrenders when deployment warnings are announced.
 - c. Suspect stops fighting with officers and complies when deployment warning is given.
 - d. Suspect runs, police service dog is deployed, suspect surrenders, and police service dog is called off.
 - e. Suspect's actions are directly affected by the presence of the police service dog.
 - f. Any arrest initiated by a canine handler.
4. With the exception of bites that occur during training, all bites will be reported in an incident report and the canine log. The handler involved is responsible for making the report prior to the end of his shift.
5. If the officer involved believes a canine incident does not warrant an incident report, the officer will report the incident on an interoffice memo or by email to the Sergeant prior to the end of their shift.
6. All noteworthy incidents not resulting in a bite should also be entered in the canine log by the officer involved, including, but not limited to, all newsworthy incidents/events, incidents where the psychological presence of a PSD prevented violence, death, or injury to a citizen, suspect or officer, all on duty canine officer injuries, and all assists to other agencies.

Call Out Procedures

1. When an officer requests a canine call out, Dispatch will attempt to notify the on-call Canine officer. If available, the Canine officer shall attempt to contact the officer, or another officer on scene, to determine the feasibility of the canine application prior to his/her response to the scene.

2. Upon request of another agency for a call out of a FPD canine team, the Patrol supervisor should evaluate the circumstances of the requested call out to determine if the call out would serve the best interest of the Police Department and the Canine unit.

Police Service Dogs

1. All dogs accepted for training and use by the canine unit are the sole property of the Fairfield Police Department. Department owned canines are not available for breeding purposes. The dogs are to be considered a valuable tool, issued by the Police Department. Proper care and maintenance of the dogs is the responsibility of the Canine officer(s). The responsibility is assumed by the officer(s) when they are assigned to the Canine Unit. The dog may be subject to transfer between handlers to enhance the efficiency of the team and/or unit.
2. Retired police service dogs may be placed with the handlers at the option of the City of Fairfield.

Police Service Dogs Selection Criteria

Dogs eligible to provide patrol service to the Fairfield Police Department will meet the following criteria:

1. German or Belgian Shepherds or Belgian Malinois. (Other breeds may be considered for single purpose narcotic detector only dogs).
2. Be at least mid-sized (65-110 pounds minimum).
3. Have proportionate lines harmonious with a straight solid back and shoulders.
4. Be a minimum of 11 months of age.
5. All dogs must have a general physical exam to include fecal exam and DHL and rabies boosters. The physical examination is an important element in the pre-testing program. It must include a teeth exam and a hip dysplasia exam. For economic reasons, dogs must successfully complete temperament testing and meet all other requirements prior to scheduling the physical exam.
6. Before any dog is considered for police training, it must be tested and evaluated as to its fitness for service. The purpose of pre-testing is to determine if the animal has any undesirable temperament characteristics that would adversely affect his serviceability. Testing will be conducted by at least two members of the Canine Unit including the prospective handler. Pre-testing shall measure the following qualities for all dogs considered for service with the Fairfield Police Department:
 - a. Temperament
 - b. Alertness
 - c. Prey and defense drives
 - d. Play and retrieving drives
 - e. Utilization of Police Service Dog
7. The handler has the responsibility for the police service dog and its actions. The handler shall exercise control over his/her dog at all times.

Deployments. A police service dog may be deployed under any of the following circumstances:

1. For the protection and/or safety of the handler, the police service dog, or other officers or persons.
2. To locate, apprehend or control suspects is reasonably believed to be violent or dangerous.
3. To search for evidence, or other contraband.
4. To apprehend a criminal suspect when the canine handler reasonably believes that the severity of the crime warrants the application of the canine.
5. To locate and apprehend hidden suspects when it would be unsafe for officers to proceed into the area.

Prior to each canine deployment, the handler must objectively assess:

1. The severity of the crime at issue;
2. The age of the suspect, if known;
3. Whether, in the case of a search for a suspect, the suspect poses an immediate threat of harm to officer or others;
4. Whether, in the case of a search for a suspect, the suspect is actively resisting arrest or attempting to evade arrest by flight.

Definitions

1. A "Deployment" is defined as a removal of the dog from the patrol car for any legitimate law enforcement purpose. Therefore, merely breaking the dog, participating in training, or using the dog in a demo would not be considered a deployment since those activities are not "enforcement" related.
2. For reporting purposes, a dog bite shall be defined as any gripping of a person's body or clothing by the dog's mouth, irrespective of injury or damage. Additionally, any injury or damage to a person's body or clothing caused by contact with the dog's teeth, i.e., rakes, abrasions, or tearing of clothing, will also be reported.

Notifications: In the event of a dog bite on duty, the handler will notify the Patrol supervisor immediately. In the event of an off-duty bite, the handler shall notify the Lieutenant immediately.

Medical Care: In every situation where a person has been bitten or injured (including death) by a canine, the following procedure will be followed:

1. Immediately notify the on-duty Patrol supervisor.

2. Ask permission to look at the affected area. Take a color photo of the alleged bite area whether or not there is visible injury.
3. If there is no visible injury, ask the person if he wants medical treatment and if so, have EMS personnel look at the injury. If the person refuses medical treatment, make a note of that and have a witness present if possible.
4. If there is an obvious injury, take a photograph of the area and have EMS respond whether the person wants treatment or not. If in the opinion of EMS personnel, officer, or Patrol supervisor, the person should have medical treatment, he is to be transported to the hospital whether he wants treatment or not.
5. If on any alleged bite, the person requests to be examined by a doctor, he is to be transported to the hospital or equivalent medical center for examination.
6. Notification of all bites or injuries (including death) will be reported without delay (TBP 7.35)

Reports

1. The Patrol supervisor will investigate the incident and the handler will prepare a Response to Resistance report with complete details of the circumstances surrounding the bite. The report will contain the injured person's name, DOB, address, telephone number, extent of injuries, hospital and/or physician name, and list of all witnesses, including officers.
2. The handler will prepare an incident report containing all the facts of the bite to accompany any other reports from the arresting officer.
3. All Response to Resistance reports will be forwarded to the Chief of Police via the chain of command to review the circumstances surrounding the bite, except bites incurring during training. (TBP 7.35)
4. The findings will be classified as "justifiable", non-justifiable" or "accidental".
5. When the circumstances at the time of the bite are consistent with the provisions of this policy, the bite shall be classified as justifiable.
6. When the circumstances at the time of the bite were not consistent with the provisions of this policy, the bite shall be classified as non-justifiable.
7. If negligence on the part of the handler is an element resulting in a bite, the finding shall be classified as non-justifiable.
8. Any indication of inattention, laxity, neglect, recklessness or failure to exercise the care that a prudent handler usually exercises, shall be construed as negligence.

9. When the circumstances at the time of the bite were not consistent with the provisions of this policy and the bite is not judged to be justifiable or non-justifiable and the bite was an unforeseen event, the bite shall be classified as accidental.
10. All dog bites occurring during training will be reported in accordance with existing "First report of injury" forms.
11. All bites, with the exception of bites that occur during training, will be entered in the unit's caninelog.
12. Non-Bite Injuries: Any injuries caused by a police service dog, not associated with a bite, will also be investigated by a supervisor and reported on a Response to Resistance report. Although non-bite injuries must be documented, they will not be categorized as "bites" or included in the Canine Unit statistical reports. Non-bite injury reports will be routed to the Lieutenant via the chain of command.
13. Property Damage: The handler involved will document property damage caused by a police service dog on a memo to the Sergeant. The memo will be routed to the Lieutenant.

Police Service Dog Restrictions

1. It is important that the handler understand his responsibility anytime a police service dog is deployed. The following factors should be considered:
2. Handlers will not allow their dogs to urinate or defecate in or around any inhabited building.
3. FPD personnel shall not tease or agitate a police service dog, nor allow others to do so, except during authorized training.
4. No person shall work or train a police service dog without prior approval of the Lieutenant.
5. Handlers should normally park their vehicle in such a way as to limit public access to the police service dog.
6. Police service dogs should generally not be taken inside a residence on family disturbance calls or on routine business.
7. Police service dogs should generally not be taken into crowded public places.
8. When the handler is out of sight or away from the vehicle for an extended period, the door release mechanism must be in the "locked" position.
9. All non-emergency, out of city travel utilizing the dog must have prior approval of the Lieutenant.

Off Duty Restrictions on Use of Police Service Dog

1. All restrictions outlined in the previous section, "Restrictions on Use of Police Service Dog" also apply to the off-duty use of a police service dog.
2. Police service dogs will be housed in a secure kennel or enclosed area approved by the Chief of Police.
3. Police service dogs will not be allowed to run unsupervised in public areas or areas accessible to the public, such as an unfenced yard.
4. While the police service dog handler is out of town, or not able to care for the daily needs of the dog, the dog will be cared for by either another canine handler, immediate family member who has bonded with the police service dog, or by an approved commercial kennel or veterinarian.
5. Police service dogs are not pets, and are not to be used for the following:
 - a. Jogging partner in heavily traveled public areas.
 - b. To play with non-immediate family members, friends, neighbors or relatives.
 - c. To play unsupervised with immediate family members such as children or spouses.
 - d. To intermingle with other non-family dogs
 - e. Any outside business enterprise (i.e. guard dog).

Unattended Police Service Dogs

Generally, police service dogs should not be left unattended for an extended period. When not under the immediate control of the handler, the dog is to be secured in a department issued kennel, or inside a properly equipped canine vehicle. There will be instances when it may become necessary to leave the dog unattended for a short period of time. When this becomes necessary, the following precautions must be taken:

1. When securing the dog outside the canine vehicle, steps should be taken to ensure that the dog cannot injure himself or others.
2. Ensure that the dog has enough shade during warm weather.
3. Ensure that the dog has an adequate supply of water.
4. It is essential that the police service dog is checked periodically to ensure that he is not in distress.

Handler Duties if Police Service Dog is Injured or Ill

1. If a police service dog is injured or ill, the assigned handler will immediately inform the patrol supervisor. Serious illness or injury should also be reported immediately to the Lieutenant.
2. If the dog becomes sick or injured to the extent that professional medical attention is required, it shall be the responsibility of the handler to transport the dog to the veterinarian.

3. Annual checkups and any non-emergency care will be done by the contract veterinarian.

Injured Handler Procedures

1. All officers shall consider the following course of action in the event a canine handler is injured and unable to command his/her dog. If the handler is down, the dog will more than likely stand guard over his handler and prevent anyone from approaching. The dog and handler train, live, and work together. The dog's attitude will change if the handler is hurt or in danger.
2. Request assistance of another canine handler or supervisor immediately.
3. DO NOT rush in on the handler or dog.
4. Call to the handler. If possible, the handler will call the dog off.
5. If the handler is unable to assist, move the handler's car to a position as close as possible to the handler and canine.
6. A training sleeve should be removed from the trunk of the canine vehicle. The canine will recognize the sleeve as a training tool and toy. Once the canine's attention has been drawn to the sleeve, the sleeve should be placed in the back of the vehicle and the command "take it" given to the canine. The canine should enter the car to retrieve the training sleeve. The door should then be closed.
7. The canine should NOT be shot if the above attempts fail. The assistance of an experienced canine handler should be requested without delay.

Canine Handler Selection Criteria

Personnel requesting assignment as a canine handler should submit a memo to the Chief of Police via the chain of command. In recommending officers for this position, supervisors shall consider overall patrol experience, productivity, reliability, judgment, maturity, patience, interpersonal skills, and physical condition.

Qualifications:

1. Applicants for the position of canine handler must possess the following minimum qualifications:
2. Satisfactory evaluation.
3. Approval of the Chief of Police.
4. Self-starter, self-disciplined, strong interpersonal skills and general law enforcement skills.
5. Agree to serve as a canine handler for a minimum of 3 years based on satisfactory performance.

6. Agree to be available for call outs during off duty hours.
7. Agree to provide a home environment for the proper care and supervision of the assigned dog.
8. Be physically fit and pass a physical fitness assessment. (1.5-mile timed run)
9. The Chief of Police will make the final decision on the selection of a canine handler.

Canine Unit Training

1. Mandatory maintenance training for general service dogs will be conducted as follows:
 - a. Weekly – 4 hours per week.
 - b. Daily – 15 minutes on working days.
 - c. As assigned to correct specific problems.
2. Training is crucial to the effectiveness of the unit and field readiness of the handlers and their dogs. All training is conducted on an in-service basis and handlers should be prepared to respond to any request for a canine unit during training.
3. Any handler having a training related problem shall contact the Lieutenant when the problem is noted.
4. Canine handlers shall attend all training sessions as directed by the Chief of Police. Handlers must obtain approval in advance to be excused from training.
5. All handlers will participate fully during training sessions. This includes being on time, acting as an agitator when requested, watching all scenarios as directed by the trainer and giving complete attention to the trainer and the training.
6. The handler will document all training performance in his training log.

Certification of Performance Standards (TBP 7.35)

1. All canine teams must successfully complete the National Detector Dog Association (NNDDA) patrol dog and narcotic detector standards certification or Nationally Recognized equivalent, prior to being deployed in the field.
2. The annual certification, which is required, will consist of an evaluation of the standards by an NNDDA certifying official.
3. Only certified (handler/canine) team will have authority to direct canine to perform Law Enforcement function.

Canine Equipment and Supplies

1. All handlers will maintain their equipment, which will be furnished at the agency expense, in safe working condition.
 - a. 15' or longer tracking lead
 - b. 6' lead
 - c. Nylon Harness
 - d. Proper metal collar (slip/prong)
 - e. Flat Collar with "POLICE" identifiers
 - f. Badge for Canine
 - g. Badge holder for Canine
 - h. Canine hairbrush
 - i. Water/feed bowl(s)
 - j. Or any other K9 care item determined by the Chief of Police
2. Any broken or malfunctioning equipment will be reported to the Lieutenant.
3. Supplies and equipment will be obtained with the approval of the Lieutenant.
4. Dog food will be paid for by the Police Department.

Kennel Facility

Each handler will be provided with a department purchased kennel. The Officer is responsible for the upkeep and sanitation of the kennel. The kennel will be subject to inspection by the Lieutenant and/or Chief of Police.

Canine Vehicles (TBP 7.35)

Handlers are responsible for ensuring that their vehicles are working properly and that they are cleaned regularly and are subject to inspection at any time.

The canine team will also be issued a patrol vehicle adapted for canine use. The vehicle will be equipped with an aluminum-style container system to replace the backseat. The canine vehicle will be equipped with a remote door opener, a temperature alert system, rear window grates and a rubber floor mat. The vehicle will be clearly marked K-9 vehicle and warning on each side of the K-9 compartment. In addition, the K-9 vehicle will be equipped with in-car video equipment.

Narcotics Training Aids (TBP 7.35)

1. Substances Used for Training Purposes will be provided by the DEA, unless written approval from the Chief of Police.
 - (a) Marijuana

- (b) Cocaine
- (c) Methamphetamines
- (d) Amphetamines
- (e) Heroin
- (f) MDMA (Ecstasy)

2. Storage

- (a) Narcotics training aids will be stored in Property/Evidence section when not in use.
- (b) Canine personnel will check the training aids out of Property/Evidence and check them back in upon completion of training.
- (c) The training aids will be stored in a locked portion of the canine vehicles while in the possession of canine personnel.

4. Records and Inspection

- (a) On a quarterly basis the canine officers will weigh and inspect the training aids to ensure there are no discrepancies in weight. This inspection will be documented and sent to the Division Commander for review and approval.
- (b) Any discrepancies discovered during the inspection will be described in a memorandum to the Operations Lieutenant.
- (c) Any loss or damage to the training aids will be immediately reported to the Operations Lieutenant and documented in a memorandum sent through the chain of command to the Chief of Police.
- (d) Command staff may conduct unannounced inspections and/or audits of the narcotics training aids at any time.

5. Replacement of Training Aids

- (a) Training aids will be replaced in accordance with DEA guidelines.
- (b) FORM DEA-41 – *Registrant Record of Controlled Substances Destroyed* will be retained after destruction.

Canine Tactics

The tactics and manner in which a police service dog is to be utilized in a specific police operation shall be the decision of the canine handler and within the dog's ability and departmental policy. The on-duty

supervisor has final authority on the utilization of a police service dog in any police operation. Any deployment of a dog must comply with this policy.

Use of Canine in Tactical Situations

Teams should be utilized primarily for perimeter control. Canines are considered less than lethal and should not be used if an incident has risen to the level of possible deadly force.

Apprehension

1. Police service dogs are trained to locate and control persons on command. When the police service dog is used in this manner, each handler will adhere to the following guidelines:
2. Before the dog is released, the handler must take reasonable steps to ensure that the person to be apprehended is the suspect. The handler shall, unless there is reason to believe that his safety or the safety of others will be jeopardized, verbally warn the suspect that the dog will be released. The warning should be substantially as follows:
 - a. "THIS IS THE FAIRFIELD POLICE DEPARTMENT. COME OUT NOW OR I WILL SEND IN A POLICE DOG AND YOU MAY BE BITTEN AND HURT." (Pause to give the suspect a chance to respond before releasing the dog.
 - b. "THIS IS THE FAIRFIELD POLICE DEPARTMENT. STOP OR I WILL SEND IN A POLICE DOG AND YOU MAY BE BITTEN OR HURT." (Pause to give the suspect a chance to respond.)
3. When the dog is released, advise the dispatcher, when practical, that the dog is in pursuit. The handler will follow the dog until the suspect is apprehended.
4. The handler will not knowingly send the dog after the suspect being pursued by other officers.
5. When the police service dog locates a suspect, the dog will normally be allowed to control the suspect until the handler arrives and affects the arrest. The handler will relinquish custody of the suspect to the first available unit.
6. If a bite occurs, the dog should be left on the bite until the suspect can be safely taken into custody. The cover officer will normally be directed to take custody of the suspect while the handler takes physical control of the dog.
7. In the event that no cover officer is available during a bite, the dog should normally be left on the bite until the handler can safely take the suspect into custody. The handler should order the suspect to "STOP FIGHTING THE DOG. SHOW ME YOUR HANDS." The handler will then command the dog to release the bite.
8. In no event will the canine be allowed to bite or inflict injury beyond that necessary to affect the arrest.

Searching Procedures

1. Building Searches. Before conducting any building search, the canine handler shall contact the primary unit at the scene to:
 - a. Verify entry and method used.
 - b. Develop intelligence from officers at the scene to determine the best location to start.
 - c. Check to see if any officers have entered the building and are still inside. Verify perimeter security.
 - d. Conduct perimeter survey. The survey should normally be conducted with the dog on lead unless off lead deployment is tactically necessary.
 - e. Establish time of occurrence.
 - f. Select a cover officer and brief him/her regarding their role as "cover unit".
 - g. Assume surveillance position at entry. Stop, look, and listen and allow the dog to scent.
 - h. Give the warning loudly and clearly at least two times. "THIS IS THE FAIRFIELD POLICE DEPARTMENT. COME OUT NOW OR I WILL SEND IN A POLICE DOG AND YOU MAY BE BITTEN AND HURT."
 - i. Deploy the dog to clear the immediate area before entering.
 - j. Once inside the building the cover officer shall remain with the canine handler and follow his/her directions.
2. Residential Building. The handler should utilize the same procedures for residential searches as in commercial building searches; however, the following shall also apply:
 - a. Before conducting a search of a residence, the handler shall take reasonable steps to ensure the safety of any residents that might be present.
 - b. Residential searches should normally be conducted on lead unless the handler can reasonably determine that there are not residents in the home. This can be done through witness or victim statements.

Open Area Searches

Before conducting a search for a suspect in an open area, the handler shall contact the officer in charge of the scene and determine the following:

1. Nature and severity of the crime.
2. Suspect description.
3. Location suspect was last seen and direction of travel.

4. Length of time since the suspect was last seen.
5. If any officers have entered the search area and are still present within the search area.
6. If perimeter has been established, and if it is still secure.

When entering the search area, the handler shall ensure the following has been accomplished:

1. Assign and brief a cover officer if one is available.
2. Advise by radio that a search is going to be conducted with a police service dog, and the location of the search.
3. Use of proper surveillance position as dictated by the circumstances.
4. Give announcement twice with a short pause: "THIS IS THE FAIRFIELD POLICE DEPARTMENT. COME OUT NOW OR I WILL SEND IN A POLICE DOG AND YOU MAY BE BITTEN AND HURT." (Pause before deploying the dog to give the suspect a chance to respond or give up.)
5. Send the dog.
6. When conducting an open area search, the handler must make every reasonable effort to always remain in contact with the police service dog. When evaluating how far out to allow the police service dog to work, the handler shall consider hazards to the police service dog, size of the search area, and the location of the perimeter and the public.
7. The cover unit, if available, shall remain with the canine handler and follow his/her directions.
8. When the police service dog locates a suspect, the dog will control the suspect until the handler arrives.
9. The cover officer, if possible, will normally be directed to take custody of the suspect. The handler will be responsible for controlling the police service dog.
10. If a bite occurs during an apprehension, reporting procedures outlined above shall be followed.
11. If two or more suspects are involved, the handler should maintain his/her position until another cover officer arrives.
12. If there is only one suspect, the handler will follow the cover officer and suspect out of the area with the dog on lead.
13. In the event of a foot pursuit involving the dog, the handler will advise Dispatch as soon as reasonably practical.

14. During foot pursuits involving the dog, care must be taken to avoid injury to bystanders. In heavily populated areas, handlers should weigh the need for a foot pursuit against the potential risk of injury to citizens or other officers.

15. When beginning a foot pursuit, the handler should, when practical, loudly shout a warning:

“STOP OR I’LL SEND A POLICE DOG.” (After the warning, give the suspect time to respond or give up.)

Lost or Missing Persons

The canine team should not be used to search for lost or missing persons without being muzzled, and the handler will determine if the situation is suitable for a search.

Pursuits

When an officer becomes involved in a felony pursuit, the canine team should move toward the area to assist with the dog, should it become necessary. Canine handlers shall comply at all times with departmental pursuit procedures when responding to calls for service.

Transportation of Prisoners and the General Public

1. Prisoners will not be transported in canine unit vehicles.
2. While transporting passengers in the canine unit vehicle, they will be instructed on how to conduct themselves while in the vehicle.
